### **PUEBLO AREA COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS**

### June 22, 2023

A meeting of the Pueblo Area Council of Governments was held on Thursday, June 2, 2023. The meeting was held in person. The meeting was called to order by Mr. Larry Atencio, PACOG Chairman, at 12:19 p.m.

### **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

There were no public comments.

The PACOG Board received a request to update the agenda. The agenda was updated to add agenda item No. 9 at this point in the meeting. The item being added was an executive session and the end of the agenda's normal business. The changes to the agenda were added and then acted upon by a motion by Heather Graham and a second by Larry Atencio.

### **CONSENT ITEMS**:

Ms. Carmen Howard, PACOG Manager, summarized the Consent Items for PACOG. The minutes from the May 25, 2023 Board meeting were approved and the financial reports from January, February, and March 2023 were received to be filed.

Chairman Atencio asked if there were any other additions or amendments to the Consent Items or if any of the members or audience would like an item removed or discussed that was on the Consent agenda. There were no other additions or amendments.

It was moved by Larry Atencio and seconded by Heather Graham, and passed unanimously to approve the Consent Items listed below as presented:

### MANAGER'S REPORT (Carmen Howard)

- A Manager's Report: (Carmen Howard)
  Nothing to report
- B The Transportation Commissioner or CDOT Region 2 Report (Terry Hart or Shane Ferguson Neither Shane Ferguson or Terry Hart were in attendance for the PACOG meeting. Geoff Guthrie from CDOT Region 2 reported on the Transportation Commission meeting and the Region 2 report. Mr. Guthrie stated the Region 2 RTD, Shane Ferguson could not be in attendance today nor is he able to make the July meeting, but he will be in attendance for the August 2023 meeting.

The Transportation Commission workshop and Monthly meeting happened on June 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> respectively, Mr Guthrie stated that the agenda had the following items discussed:

- There were two budget amendments to CDOTs FY 2024 budget. Budget amendment for program both on-system and off-system Bridge Replacement & Rehab Program on AND off System, \$5.25M to off-system bridge load rating reevaluations statewide/\$10.25M to fatigue cracks
- 2. Budget amendment for O & M on C470
- 3. Audit Review Committee met, but no packet materials included
- 4. Update to PD 1610 GHG transit mitigation measures to assume statewide transit fleet at 100% EV/ZEVs by 2050, "which is in alignment with Colorado's energy goals" (previous assumption was 100% by 2033)
- 5. Bustang/Outrider Update: Trinidad to Pueblo route launched March 2023 with 2 daily round trips and free fares through August 31st
- 6. Rural TPR Boundary Study underway- requirement of HB 23-1101 that CDOT analyze TPR boundaries and provide recommendations to TC by 11/30/23; does not affect MPOs; CDOT staff is developing mapping tool, assessing TPR IGAs/Bylaws, setting up numerous public meetings throughout state; there are ~21 criteria as factors for consideration
- 7. Fee-based ROW access for fiber- proposed simplified fee structure/improved process to facilitate access to CDOT ROW for deployment of broadband; revised proposed structure with initial setup and annual recurring fees outlined

### June STAC updates:

Over the next 3 months STAC meetings are FY24-27 program distribution covering multiple funds affecting MPOs/TPRs, this is the first step in the process for the upcoming 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan; please contact me/Rob/Shane for questions

### Region 2 updates:

- 1. R2 Cleanup Day was May 23rd: volunteer forces from all divisions picked up 881 bags of garbage in the Pueblo area and 2,606 bags across R2- yay team!
- 2. Pueblo-area projects update = I-25/US50B interchange in design/ROW
- 3. US50B east of I-25 resurfacing is done with nice new asphalt surface that I rode my motorcycle on this past weekend
- 4. Dillon Drive east frontage road and roundabout/I-25/Drew Dix in construction until December 2024
- 5. US50B and CO-231 (36th Lane) intersection conflict warning system in construction August 2023 December 2023
- 6. US50C and CO-231 (36th Lane) intersection public open house with BOCC 6/26 at 5:30pm at Giodone Branch Library
- 7. FY23 sign replacement project underway across area through June 2023

Finally, June 24th at 9am is the monthly Front Range Passenger Rail District Board meeting, and the FRPR Service Development Plan is underway, along with a planned October 2023 FRPR District BOD workshop and tour here in Pueblo- more details to come from FRPR staff.

During this discussion, Commissioner Swearingen brough up the I-25 Abriendo exit and its need for upgrades and Dennis Flores brought up the need to have a rest area in the Pueblo County area. He felt its unfriendly to the traveling public not to have a rest area in the region. Mr. Flores has a meeting with the region 2 director and will bring the topic up for discussion at their meeting.

### C State Transportation Advisory Committee (STAC) June 2023 Meeting Update

Eva Cosyleon added to the information shared by Mr. Guthrie's STAC report. She stated the TAP funding program was discussed at the STAC meeting, the HB1101 public process was also discussed, she reminded the BOD that CDOT HQ public relations gave the presentation last month on the process that will begin soon about the HB1101 requirements. HB1101 also has requirements for consistency in the TPR transportation planning processes. The CDOT public relations office is looking at those processes with each TPR and making recommendations for updates, as necessary. Ms. Cosyleon also stated all transportation funding programs, their formulas for distribution, and the consolidated planning grant funds which are operational funds for the PACOG MPO are all going to be reviewed and updated for current needs. CDOT has published a work schedule, there is a link to the posted information below for details on CDOT STAC website.

FY2023 STAC Workplan For STAC Leadership Briefing (codot.gov)

This schedule will look at the current statewide distributions and it gives the locals the ability to comment on the formulas. The Consolidated Planning grant funds are also being looked at for its distribution formulas and amounts. These are the operation funds for the PACOG MPO. The PACOG area is not eligible to receive funds in all funding categories.

MPO Staff Report (Eva Cosyleon, MPO Manager)

### A Safe Streets for All Grant & RAISE Grant Update -

Ms. Cosyleon gave a brief update on the Safe streets for all Grant and the RAISE grant. The City of Pueblo recently received a federal RAISE grant in the amount of \$16,834,725. This grant is one of the largest grants the area has received in a while. The project funded by the grant is the "West side Pueblo connector." The project has four phases. The first phase is the design and construction of two roundabouts, one at Spaulding and 31st Street and the other at Spaulding and 27th Street, which are at each end of the new Sun Mountain roadway. The second phase of this project is for design and construction of the Sun Mountain roadway as well, the other phase is for project has a phase for the design and planning of the 24th Street bridge and the connection to downtown. The final phase is the upgrade of 70 bus stops on the west side. The upgrade will cover ADA needs, bus shelters and better access to the transit system as a whole on the west side of the community.

Ms. Cosyleon turned the presentation over to Mr. Andrew Hays, the City of Pueblo's Public Works Director, he then gave an update on where they are in the implementation of the RAISE Grant and the implementation of the Safe Streets for All Grant. The RAISE Grant is a direct recipient grant. The City is working with FHWA to get the funds contracted, to set up schedules, phases and reallocate some more funds within the award to the transit activities. Originally there was \$7 million dedicated to the planning activities for the project, The transit element had about \$800,000 allocated, it really needs \$3,000,000 to do all that is needed. So, the funds to do the transit work are coming from the planning allocation. Once all the reallocations and phasing are decided the information will be taken back to City Council for approval in about a month or so and it will come back to the PACOG Board for information.

The next item Mr. Hays reported on was the Safe Streets for all Grant. The grant is for a comprehensive safety plan in the Pueblo area transportation planning region and inside the MPO area. The city of Puelo and the PACOG area put forth a joint effort to provide the match required of the grant. The grant will allow for the identification of joint areas for safety projects so the projects can be moved forward for competitive grant programs for funding the needed upgrades or new projects. The first reading will go to City Council Monday the 26<sup>th</sup> and the public work associated with the grant will begin in the August - September time frame.

- B CDOT Region II Request for PACOG MPO/TPR TIP Amendment, FY 2023-2027 Transportation Improvement Program. Ms. Eva Cosyleon, MPO Manager, reported the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) administrative modifications as listed below:
  - 1. Project TIP amend: #2023.019 Pueblo Transit Shop Truck Replacement STIP Number: TBD THIS IS ROLL-FORWARD On November, TIP 2022-2025, Amendment 2202.021, \$75,000 was allocated to Pueblo Transit from ARPA funds for purchase of one Pueblo Transit Shop Truck Replacement. A vehicle was purchased. There are remaining funds, in the amount of \$28.000, which will be used to purchase an additional Transit Shop Truck.

- 2. Project TIP amend: TIP Amend: #2023.020 Pueblo West Side Connector RAISE Grant STIP Number: SPB6001.999 West side of Pueblo multimodal connections improvements Fund Source(s): 2022 USDOT Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity Federal Discretionary Grant in the amount of \$16,834,725. This administrative action adds this project to the STIP in alignment with the PACOG TIP.
- 3. Project TIP amend: TIP Amend: #2023.021 Add SB 267 funds to the right of way phase in the amount of \$5,000,000.
- 4. Project TIP amend: TIP amend: 2023-022 US 50 A MP 296 to 310. This amendment updates the funding years in the TIP and the STIP to match. No funding changes.
- C Complete Streets Update Bonforte Avenue

Ms. Cosyleon gave a brief overview of the complete streets program to remind everyone that the program is geared to making a road way accessible by all modes of travel, safely. There were two previous workshops prior to the Walk audit that was completed on Bonforte Blvd. The route was split into two areas, one to the north and one to the south. The participants were split into the two groups and looked at the issues on both sides of the street. They both started from the Barkman Branch of the Library and the north group went to Horseshoe Drive and the South group went to Hunter Drive. They looked to identify issues, for example is the sidewalk wide enough for two people, are there trip hazards, are there ADA ramps with truncated domes, are the push button controls accessible, is the timing in the cross walk enough time to cross, and are the transit stop locations accessible and sufficient in size. A member of the ADA commission also attended and gave a realistic perspective from using a motorized wheelchair /scooter. She found may deficiencies in the area that made her use of the sidewalks and ramps in many cases not accessible at all. Next steps: another walk audit will be done, it will be a spot audit at McCullogh and Spaulding on July 14, 2023. The goal is to identify connectivity, is the area accessible, are there sidewalks, what are the conditions of the sidewalks? In August a meeting will be held with a summarization of all the data collected. The issues will be identified and then a look will be given for funding the issues that were identified. Bonforte is scheduled to be paved soon so some of the issues will be addressed in that effort.

D Bike to Workday - June 28th

Bike to workday is June 28<sup>th</sup>. The MPO is trying to revive the event. We have a community with a lot of great trails, and amenities. The MPO got 6 partners to work with the MPO on Bike to workday.

Community Services Advisory Commission Ballots for two renewal member appointments:

Ballots were taken from the City and County participants of the meeting for awarding the renewed appointments to the commission and forwarded back to Rochelle Cruz for action.

### ACCOUNTANTS' COMPILATION REPORT

Board of Directors Pueblo Area Council of Governments Pueblo, Colorado

Management is responsible for the accompanying balance sheet of the general fund of Pueblo Area Council of Governments (PACOG) as of April 30, 2023, and the related statement of general fund revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balance for the one-month and four months then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have performed a compilation engagement in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services promulgated by the Accounting and Review Services Committee of the AICPA. We did not audit or review the financial statements, nor were we required to perform any procedures to verify the accuracy or completeness of the information provided by management. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion, a conclusion, nor provide any form of assurance on these financial statements.

Management has elected to omit substantially all of the disclosures required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. If the omitted disclosures were included in the financial statements, they might influence the user's conclusions about PACOG's financial position and results of operations. Accordingly, the financial statements are not designed for those who are not informed about such matters.

PACOG records accounts receivable and related revenue or deferred inflows of resources and accounts payable and related expenditures using the cash basis of accounting. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that accounts receivable and related revenue or deferred inflows of resources and accounts payable and related expenditures be recorded using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Management has not determined the amounts by which these departures would affect the balance sheet of the general fund and the related statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balance of the general fund.

### **Required Supplementary Information**

Management has omitted the management's discussion and analysis and the budgetary comparison schedule for the general fund that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context.

### **Additional Information**

The additional information reported on pages 5 through 7 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. This information is the representation of management. This information was subject to our compilation engagement; however, we have not audited or reviewed the additional information and, accordingly, do not express an opinion, a conclusion, nor provide any form of assurance on such additional information.

### Minutes June 1, 2023, Pueblo CO ADA Advisory Committee

After introductions and welcoming new member Elizabeth Harmes, and eventually acceptance of the May minutes as amended,

**City Report** Todd Beresford reported on numerous projects either completed or almost completed: La Cross, Abriendo, Ridge Drive, 100% of the Grove sidewalks, which was a citizen request, and Troy Avenue. The Joplin ramps are done.

The Dillon by Sam's and Walmart is about 30% done and should be done in 6 weeks. The Roundabouts are a separate project. They will be starting Prairie on the East side at the Walmart Marketplace toward Northern, then do the west side. The avenue will have the outer lane shut down. It is a 180-day contract and he anticipates that it will be done in about 90 days.

Handicapped parking for the river below the Chinese restaurant will be at the base of the road and parking for other will be about halfway down. The West 11<sup>th</sup> Street project is started. There is no room for sidewalks, so it will be asphalt. Bike trails will go from the Boulevard behind Kaiser. Northern by the Safeway to the west will start this month.

Laura: ADA Access to parks is a problem. Due to no sidewalks.

Transit Reports Kent reports that the zero fare for better air starting June 1 through August is now underway. There is a robust ad campaign underway with ads in the Chieftain and Star-Journal, on radio and TV and a big billboard on Main Street. The raffle they tried last year mostly benefited the usual riders and didn't do much to attract new riders. Elizabeth suggested putting the flyer on the accessibility site.

- They report that paratransit drivers are almost all filled. Tura complemented several drivers. There are also 3 new buses, but they appear to need rather more work than anticipated. They will retire old buses.
- Kent reports that they have two new fixed route drivers that need training first and are going to see if they can have one more driver than needed.
- There was a woman crawling with bedbugs riding the bus. It was legal to keep her off of public transportation, and they got Social Services involved in helping her.
- Issue: bus benches and shelters: We need them, but it is complicated. The City needs to get easements from landowners, and they can't be places where they cause other problems like drug use in the shelter. CDOT will do the bus stops where they have purview, but it is easier to work with the City than CDOT. Tura pointed out that there are shelters where she cannot fit with her chair.
- Eva Cosyleon: was on agenda for the Walk Audits but will try to get her here for a Work Session. The purpose of them is to prioritize car vs pedestrian traffic
- It would be nice to know when the next bus is coming. The technology exists, and Denver is experimenting with some. We will have to see what works there and if it can be adapted at a reasonable cost for Pueblo. That is something the new Operations Supervisor is working on.
- Emergency Preparedness Ron Sasaoka reported that it is fire season, and people need to mitigate their risks. While it has been raining a lot, the weeds will dry up later and the fire ban will return.
- PWDs are invited to participate in the assorted emergency preparedness drills, both City and State. It is requested that we let them know w3 plan to come.
- The expired COVID tests might still be good, and one was in a recent experiment. However, it is not a good idea to rely on the outdated tests.

Booster shots should be updated for the next one, but you s shouldn't get one more than every 6 months. They are no longer free. You should get the Shingles shot even though it isn't free; Shingles is miserable and triggered by stress, in part.

Canon City Report Sonja reported that she and several others spoke at an assembly at the Canon City Middle School about how to make people with disabilities feel included that was very well received. Kids came up to them with questions afterwards and the tour of the renovated Middle School revealed that it is pretty accessible for mobility-challenged people.

She also reported that she has a new van which she is very happy with. Her old one is for sale.

Don raised a question about cytomegalo virus, which affects pregnant women and their babies.

Rob Gilkerson reported that he has a white paper on visuality that he will share. We need to speak before the Pueblo and Canon City Builder's Associations on that.

Dustin Taylor was asked how the Committee can help the PD. It was his first meeting and he learned about access issues and traffic control Roger Schneider who does neighborhood Watch and crime prevention helps with the library walkaround.

We need to address the Chili fest ASAP. Also, other outdoor events are not very accessible.
